EDUCATION



QUALITY EDUCATION FOR ALL!

Education is the best kind of investment for the future and investing in human capital is the best way to combat poverty. By ensuring that all children attend school and by providing the possibility for young people to acquire technical and professional skills, we are contributing to the empowerment of the population of Guinea-Bissau to be masters of their own future. Education that is inclusive, equitable, quality and promotes lifelong learning opportunities for all are Sustainable Development Goals. This is especially important for underprivileged rural communities.

ADPP Guinea-Bissau has been running two programs for a number of years: Teacher Training for primary school teachers and Vocational Training for young people.

The **ADPP-GB Teacher Training College** in Cacheu has been in operation since 2012, since when 116 teachers have graduated, 40 of whom in 2018. The three-year program combines the didactics of national primary school subjects with non-traditional, practical and theoretical subjects, to raise the level of awareness of human rights, international knowledge and understanding of contemporary challenges both for the world and the region. Students live at the school, where they develop a capacity for social understanding, conflict resolution and organization. In 2018, they implemented projects promoting human rights and preschool education in neighbouring communities.

The **ADPP-GB Vocational School** in Bissorã, which implements 11-month courses and includes a boarding



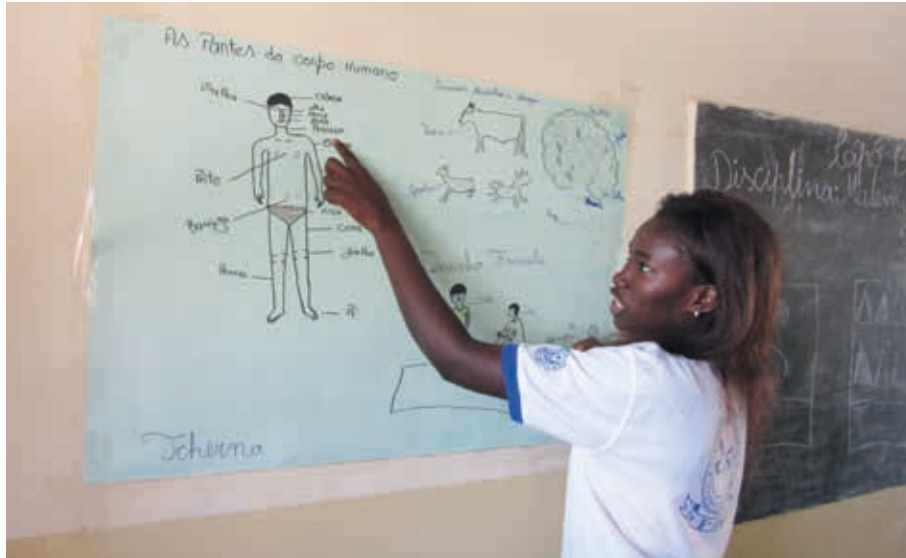
section for students, was established in 1996 since when 1,580 young people have received training in Agriculture, Construction, Commerce and Administration, Solar Energy and Electricity, Plumbing and Water Pump Maintenance. In 2018, 93 students graduated from the school on the completion of their courses. The students learn vocational skills while developing a sense of social responsibility through the implementation of community actions related to agriculture, health and hygiene.

During 2018, the school began focusing on a greater integration of entrepreneurship and the jobs market, which will have visible results in 2019. These new courses result from the collaboration of the Vocational School with other ADPP Guinea-Bissau projects such as the Rice Value Chain Development Project, funded by the African Development Bank, which benefits students from the Agriculture and Livestock course, or the Cashew Processing and Marketing Project, funded by the **European Union**, where students of Agriculture

and Livestock played a central role in the construction of a cashew processing plant and the installation of machines.

An upgrading of the **Solar Energy and Electricity** course to a more advanced level is being achieved in partnership with **Schneider Electrics Foundation**, while the promotion of three new short courses, funded by the **Camões Institute**, IP, in a project carried out in partnership with the Portuguese **NGO Sol Sem Fronteiras** (Sun without Borders), also provided for the construction of a dormitory for 36 students and a workshop for practical classes.

In Bissau, at the **Cassacá Congress School**, ADPP Guinea-Bissau built seven new classrooms for the Ministry of Education, with funding from the **Embassy of Japan in Dakar**.

Tcherná Indami's Story, ADPP-GB Teacher Training School

“When I began teaching at Capo school, I noticed that the boys were much more active during lessons than the girls. To help build more confidence among the girls, I decided that whenever I called students to come to the board, I would ask a boy and a girl or a boy and two girls.

After I started using this method, I realized that the girls were becoming less reticent about participating in classroom activities and they enjoyed doing tasks at the board. Another observation was that the classroom cleaning activities were performed only by female students. When I asked the students why only the girls swept the room, I was told that it is girls' work and that boys cannot do it. I told the students that we were going to establish responsibility areas and that each area would be looked after by a boy and a girl. Thus, we created responsibility areas for “classroom cleaning” and “discipline”.

Now we always have a boy and a girl to clean up the room and the boys are not opposed to participating in the activity while the girls are more confident in expressing their opinion.”

Joana Indami's Story, ADPP-GB Vocational School

“All of a sudden, the opportunity knocked on my door to study in Bissorã on the Agriculture and Livestock Course. When I started my training at the Vocational School, I began to adapt to a different way of life to the one I was used to.

The school has an intensive training system, which means no wasting time on irrelevant activities. During the year, I gained a lot of experience in the different professional areas

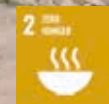
of my course and also during my periods of work experience with the Ministry of Agriculture and other institutions. In the area of Agriculture, I learned about horticultural and fruit production, the production of cereals, field selection and measuring, weeding, ploughing and finally tending of plants.

As far as animal production is concerned, I learned about selecting chickens, animal hygiene, vaccination, feeding, how to take care of chicks and so on. Regarding community development, we learned how to establish associations, how to lead community meetings, how to conduct awareness activities, how to organize common actions, how to conduct surveys with questionnaires, how to record and monitor farmers' activities. I look forward to returning to my village to support my community by sharing my new knowledge with the people.

SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE AND ENVIRONMENT

End hunger, achieve food security and improve nutrition by promoting sustainable agriculture



The target by 2030 of Sustainable Development Goal 2.3 is to “double the agricultural productivity and the incomes of small-scale food producers, particularly women, indigenous peoples, family farmers, pastoralists and fishers, including through secure and equal access to land, other productive resources and inputs, knowledge, financial services, markets and opportunities for value addition and non-farm employment.”

ADPP-GB has been working with farmers in Guinea Bissau since 2008, using an approach called **Farmers’ Clubs**. In collaboration with the **Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development**, the promotion of Farmers’ Clubs aims at providing productive growth among small and medium farmers to make their activities competitive and sustainable in order to improve food security and increase the incomes of rural households. The program empowers farmers through training and obtaining new agricultural resources and equipment, sharing resources and developing greater bargaining power in the markets.

The transition from traditional agricultural methods to more modern environmentally friendly agriculture is encouraged and the project promotes the farmers’ access to the processing and marketing of their produce, thus giving them a larger share of the income from the entire value chain.

In 2018, ADPP Guinea-Bissau continued to implement the **Cashew Processing and Marketing Project in the Oio Region, funded by the European Union**. The project aims to increase the cashew value chain by benefiting farmers, improving the capacity and quality of cashew processing production, promoting organised marketing and maximizing product utilization by introducing the cashew apple (peduncle) for processing. In addition, it aims at diversification of crops by encouraging the introduction of beans and groundnuts into traditional production cycles of cashew and promoting the creation of smallholder associations so the farmers can obtain more favourable conditions for production and sale. In 2018, construction of the Processing Centre in Bissorã

was completed in time to be operational for the 2019 cashew campaign.

In the Oio region, ADPP-GB initiated the **Rice Value Chain Development Project (PDCVRIZ)** in collaboration with the **Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development** and funded by the **African Development Bank**. The project aims to contribute to improving nutrition and food security as well as reducing poverty at national level.

In the Cacheu region, in the neighborhood of the **Teacher Training College in Bachil**, ADPP Guinea-Bissau started the project “**Labur é Nô Balur! Agriculture with value**”, **Bachil Horticultural Development Center**. The project is funded by **Direct Assistance Program (PAD) / Australian Government** to promote the establishment of a Community Centre for Horticultural Development and horticultural clubs for women in the surrounding communities.

“We used to practice monoculture in our community and never thought about the diversification of crops. Nor did we know about the rules for the correct planting of cashew trees.

Things began to change when the project started. We learned about the use of mosquito nets and about hygiene. We learned creation of orchards and the establishment of an income generation project. I would like to thank the Cashew Processing and Marketing project and the European Union for helping our community.”

“Training opens a number of opportunities for me in the future such as getting a job, helping my family, gaining knowledge of the different disciplines that make up the Agriculture course.

With this training I have also learned to live as part of a group, to have a vision about the organization of an association and always to think about learning. At the end of it all, I would like to invest in the processing of local products including the manufacture of mango juice. Personally, fruit processing is what I am interested in.”



HEALTH



HEALTHY LIFE AND WELL-BEING FOR ALL

Community knowledge, awareness and capability is the first line of defence to ensure healthy living. Working alongside people in rural communities, especially those of difficult to access, is essential to identify and treat the constant threat of epidemics and of stigmatized health problems. ADPP Guinea-Bissau also works to change cultural habits that threaten lives and health, habits which frequently affect the female population, especially girls, and require the promotion of awareness of how to use the public health system.

Among the Sustainable Development priorities is the goal to “ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages.” ADPP Guinea-Bissau’s strategy encompasses combating the spread of disease, reducing the spread of HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and other life-threatening epidemics, combining community mobilization with scientific advances in health, supporting the adoption of best health practices by giving people adequate knowledge to be able to take control of their own health and help save other people’s lives. It also involves promoting general health such as improving nutrition, maternal and child health, family planning, water and sanitation.

Since 2015, ADPP-GB has been running a **Disease Prevention and Health Program**, initially aimed at contributing to the prevention of the spread of the Ebola virus and using the strategy of Total Control of the Epidemic. In 2018, ADPP-GB ran the program in Gabú, Bolama and Bijagós and included a project to **Identify Women with Obstetric Fistula**, funded by the **United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA)**. In the regions of Gabú, Tombalí, Quinará, Bolama and Bijagós, the project **Preparation and Response to the Zika Virus** was implemented, funded by the **World Health Organization (WHO)** and in collaboration with the **National Health Institute (INASA)**, the **Community Health Department and the Regional Health Departments**.

In October 2018, ADPP-GB initiated the **Promotion of Health Improvement in the Armed Forces** aimed at the prevention, care and treatment of HIV/AIDS and sexually transmitted diseases in the Guinea-Bissau Armed Forces, their families and the communities around four military barracks in the implementation area. The project is funded by **US Department of Defence HIV/AIDS Prevention Program (DHAPP)** and ADPP Guinea-Bissau is collaborating with the **Ministry of Defence of Guinea-Bissau**, the **Ministry of Health and the National Secretariat to Combat HIV/AIDS**.

“In January this year, in Bolama Health Region, the ADPP-GB team turned up to carry out community awareness activities at public and private schools, where they passed on hygiene and sanitation messages and information about diseases such as measles, diarrhoea, malaria, Zika virus and pneumonia.

The work that the team did was very good and it helped to improve knowledge in the community about health and disease prevention. As a result of the mobilization activities, more people are seeking help at health centres. We hope all these awareness-raising activities continue during the rainy season because it is a season where many diseases appear.”

“UNFPA is pleased with the report on the pilot project Community System for the Identification of Women with Obstetric Fistula. In fact, of the 34 women with obstetric fistula operated in December 2018, ADPP-GB identified in a record time 15, or 44%, in just three health regions. This clearly means that the results could be even more significant when ADPP-GB expands this system into other regions.

UNFPA and the Ministry of Public Health, Family and Social Cohesion rely heavily on ADPP-GB to continue identifying women with obstetric fistula.”

PROMOTION OF CREATIVE ECONOMY – CULTURE, A VECTOR FOR GROWTH

Program aimed at making culture a fundamental lever for the reconstruction and transformation of Guinea-Bissau



Culture is not just looking back at history to preserve what we have; it is also about looking forward. We can learn from the past to plan the future. Change is one of the most important traditions of human culture and “Culture for Change” is a sound educational principle. Creating a new culture that confronts social challenges and potentially destructive habits contributes to the reconstruction of the fabric of society and prepares the ground for economic development. Thus, Creative Economy also contributes to fight poverty.

Promoting the Development of a Creative Economy as a vector of inclusive and sustainable economic growth is a four-year project launched in 2016 and funded by the European Union. It is being implemented in 23 neighbourhoods of Bissau with the aim of contributing to the development of governance and policies of the Guinean cultural sector. 2018 was the third year of implementation, with two Neighbourhood Cultural Centres already built, in Quelelé and in Enterramento, and

two more under construction, in Plack II and Bandim. The project promoted courses for young people in Handicraft, Theatre, Dance, Art, Oral History, Traditional Cuisine and Singing and a number of performances and exhibitions were held by students, dealing both with major issues of our time as well as Guinea-Bissau. The project collected cultural data; established a training program in Cultural Policy Management for Development, Creativity and Social Innovation, directed at technical staff; and created a virtual space for promotion and sale, with a common brand entitled Our Culture, Our Wealth, which is in the process of being finalized.

ADPP-GB’s partners in the project are the Guinean cultural group Netos de Bandim, the Ussoforal Cultural Association, the Ministry of Culture, the Bissau City Council, the National Institute of Studies and Research, Amílcar Cabral University, UNESCO National Commission and Consultants of the University of Girona.

“All the knowledge I learned during training, I am applying here at my mother’s restaurant and right now we are getting many customers who are attracted to the quality of the traditional food we’re serving.”

“After the course, we didn’t just sit with our arms folded doing nothing: we created our own cultural group called “Baloba Cultural” and we have already put into practice the experience gained during training. An example of this was that we performed in Bubaque, at the Festival organized by the Youth Associations.

Now I have been called to join the National Ballet team, which is directed by the Directorate-General for Culture of Guinea-Bissau, and where I had the opportunity to make my stage debut at the Cultural Centre Franco-Bissau this year, in commemoration of 12 September. I really learned a lot because I used to dance with the Iris de Bra cultural group, but only during the Carnival period, and I did not realize I could earn a living through dance.”

COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT

Human capacity is the driving force for change!



As everything we do in collaboration with people is intended to bring useful change, empowerment and building community solidarity is at the forefront of our intentions.

ADPP Guinea-Bissau undertook a number of projects in 2018 in the sphere of Community Development.

Irregular migration is a major challenge that drains the country of its human resources and causes suffering at all levels. The **Bu Terra Ibu Lugar Seguro** project - Reintegration of Voluntary Returned Guinean Migrants - arose to help reintegrate socioeconomically 35 young people who had returned to Guinea-Bissau. Implemented in the regions of Bafatá, Gabú and the Bissau Autonomous Sector since July 2018, the project also disseminates information on migration risks and on free movement of persons within ECOWAS.

Activities in 2018 focused on establishing the project, developing collaboration with the relevant authorities, identifying and selecting 35 young people, diagnosing irregular migration and entrepreneurship opportunities

and establishing a training program for young people in 2019. The project is part of the Support to Free Movement of Persons and Migration Program (FMM), funded by the ECOWAS Commission and the European Union and implemented by the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the International Centre for Policy Development Migration (ICMPD) and the International Labour Organization (ILO). ADPP Guinea Bissau's local partners in the project are the Directorate General of Communities and the Association of Emigrants and Friends of Guinea-Bissau.

Human Rights Education has been implemented by ADPP Guinea Bissau since 2017 in Cacheu region. In 2018, 50 students from the ADPP-GB Teacher Training College in Cacheu acted as the driving force to establish 40 local committees to implement 40 Human Rights Action Plans. The project is funded by the The Kingdom of the Netherlands Embassy in Dakar.

Youth Groups for Entrepreneurship and Community-led Total Sanitation (CLTS) are two projects implemented in 2018 by ADPP-GB. Funded by PLAN

International, both projects were implemented in Gabú. Youth Groups for Entrepreneurship sought to identify potential at local level for developing enterprises while CLTS sought to eliminate open-air defecation in Pirada and Sonaco. Among the achievements in the latter project was the construction of 58 latrines.

Improving Access to Drinking Water, Sanitation and Hygiene: in July 2018, ADPP-GB began participating in a project to build 30 wells and 50 latrines in the regions of Oio and Cacheu in partnership with the Smallholder Federation "KAFO" and with funding from SWISSAID. ADPP-GB trained 80 activists and 48 craftspeople to build of 30 latrines in 26 communities in Mansabá Mansoa and Bissorã.

Firewood Saving Stoves, a project seeking to contribute to the mitigation of climate change, continued in 2018. ADPP Guinea Bissau raised awareness among communities in Empada about climate change and promoted the production, marketing and use of stoves that use less firewood compared to traditional three-stone stoves.

“Education for Human Rights” project during teaching practice

“During teaching practice, I worked in the village of Petabe, where I established a 10-member Human Rights Committee. I organized training for the Committee, whose members created a 6-month Human Rights Awareness Plan.

On completion of training, the Committee started to organize awareness sessions. I joined in to support them and to see if they understood the messages I had shared with them during training. Through participation in these activities, I realized the committee members are prepared to share their knowledge with other community members.”



Lamine Sané, 33 years old
Bu Terra Ibu Lugar Seguro beneficiary

“My decision to emigrate was influenced by my colleagues. A man from our community chose to emigrate and now he has a job and can send money to his family. I tried to cross the Mediterranean Sea to Italy 3 times, but without any luck. When we were trying to cross the sea, we always had problems with the coastguards or with our boat. The third time I tried to cross, 30 minutes after leaving the shore, our boat had an accident. Fortunately, I was rescued by the coastguards from Libya, however, 7 passengers from our boat did not survive.

After 3 failed attempts, I realized that my destiny is not in Europe. I received information about the IOM project from my colleague who gave me the phone number of the person in charge. I contacted IOM and they recommended that I go to their nearest office and ask about voluntary return, which is what I did. So I came back to Guinea-Bissau, to my community, and today I am here with my family and my children. If I am selected for the project, I would like to participate in the Solar Panel Maintenance Technician course. Afterwards, I would like to establish my own company in Gabú.”

Sustainable Development: Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns

Sustainable Development Goals target 12.5 is “substantially reduce waste generation through prevention, reduction, recycling and reuse” by 2030



A DPP Guinea-Bissau has been importing and selling second-hand clothing and footwear since 1986. One of the objectives of the **Fundraising Project - Clothing** is also to generate funds for ADPP-GB development projects in Guinea-Bissau, benefiting numerous communities. Second-hand clothing is affordable for rural communities on low incomes and the sale of clothes contributes to the economic development of the country by encouraging entrepreneurship and job creation. The clothes are sold in large and small bales to local merchants in stores in Bissau and in the regions of Bafatá, Gabú, Oio, Cacheu, Quinará and Tombalí. The merchants then resell the clothes in local markets across the country. In 2018, 550 tons of second-hand clothes and shoes were sold in Guinea-Bissau.

On occasion, and at the request of the authorities, ADPP-GB contributed to disaster response. In 2018, through the Ministry of Women, Family and Social Solidarity, the

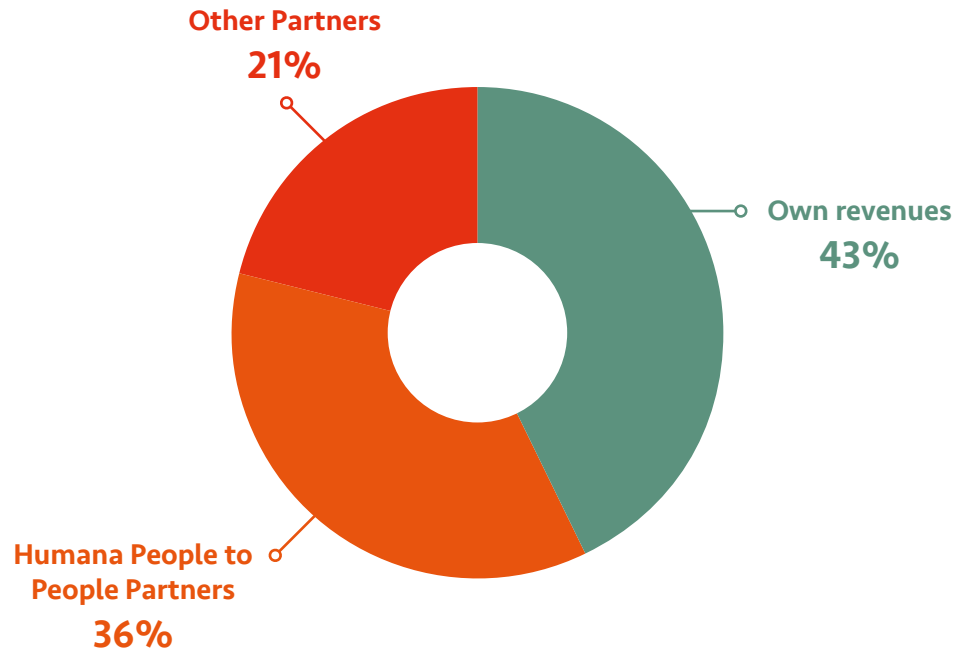
project distributed 4 tons of clothing and footwear to help families left homeless because of fires or other adverse circumstances.

ADPP Guinea-Bissau Custom Fund

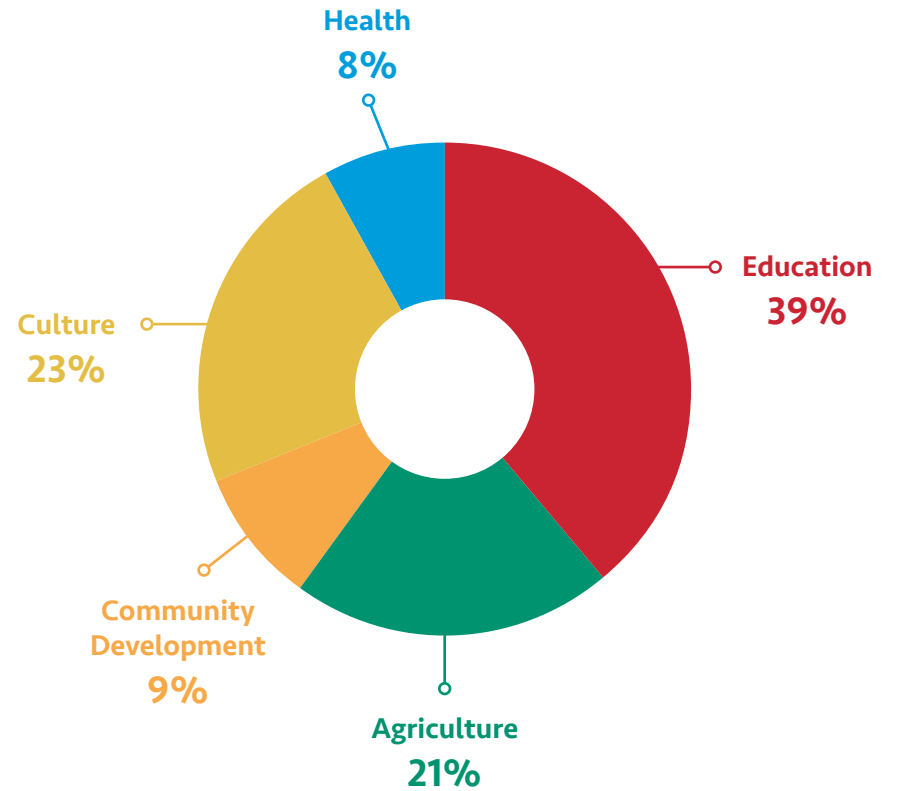
The importation and sale of second-hand clothing is an integral part of the fundraising program of ADPP Guinea-Bissau. The Custom Fund is intended to support ADPP-GB projects in the Oio region or projects promoted by local associations in that region. In 2018, the Fund supported 37 local Oio associations and four ADPP-GB projects in the same region: the Vocational School, the Cashew Processing and Marketing Project, the Rice Value Chain and the Improvement of Access to Safe Drinking Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Project.
