ADPP-GB's mission is to support the population and most needy communities in Guinea-Bissau through economic, social and cultural development projects, with the aim of increasing the well-being of the population through their active participation.

Our approach is to promote solidarity among people by establishing a foundation, creating the organisational framework to give many people access to participate actively in the development of the country and the creation of their future.

In the name of the Board of ADPP-GB, I send this greeting of gratitude to all people and communities, our employees, partners and supporters, and the Governmental entities with whom we are working for the efforts and results achieved during 2022.

This moment in history in which we live continues to bear the consequences of huge inequalities between the richest and poorest people and nations, and the effects of Global Warming and Climate Change are growing rapidly.

To counteract and change that together with people in Guinea-Bissau is the reason for our being and efforts.

The achievements and people presented on the following pages bear the proof of the saying, “dare to visualise, dare to start and fight, dare to fail and dare to try again and succeed”.

Among the results:

- 43 new teachers graduated from the Teacher Training College, reaching a total of 243 since the start of the school, representing the vision of another kind of school.
- 144 young people trained themselves at the Vocational School in various skills and added to that entrepreneurship, self-employment capacity and community service attitude, following the understanding that you educate yourself to make a difference for yourself and your community.
- 127 people trained in cultural expression skills, promoting employment possibilities for themselves as well as the understanding that Culture is a lever for economic and social change and progress.

- 650 communities with a total of approximately 65 000 people improved their sanitary installations, and more than 10 000 people were reached through HIV testing campaigns, increasing their self-understanding as the first line of defence against health-threatening practices and epidemics.

- More than 2050 farmers increased their food production and raised their understanding that food security in a world under growing threat from Climate Change and monopolising food trade is created through their collective community efforts.

- 853 tons of clothes and shoes were imported for reuse and sold, thanks to the Counterpart Fund agreement with the Government, and by so contributed to Responsible Production and Consumption, supplying people with good affordable clothes as well as making the social development project reaching their goals.

With these few examples and experiences from 2022, we look with confidence ahead to 2023.

Education





Education is fundamental for all generations to prepare themselves for counteracting Climate Change, counter-act health challenges and change the world in which we live.

It is about getting knowledge, building understanding and acquiring skills in a global world, which increases interdependency daily. That is why ADPP-GB invests in education.

ADPP-GB Teachers Training knows it takes a community to educate a child."Educating is a complex task that requires the effort of several actors. It is therefore considered one of the important pillars of social and human development".

Guinea-Bissau is a country with fragile education and low financing capacity. The lack of teachers, especially in rural areas, is a critical problem in the education system.

The ADPP-GB Teacher Training College, Bachil

aims to educate teachers engaged in the Big Issues of Our Time so that they use this engagement to train attitudes and skills to be excellent teachers for the children and youths of the 21st Century.

In addition, they train to be committed to working in rural areas with a high lack of teachers.

As a result, primary school teachers contribute to a skilled and capable new generation, improved livelihoods, community development and increased opportunities for children and youths to pursue education.



To date, 243 teachers have graduated, and contribute to developing the country's education sector.

The training programme include life skills components designed for personal growth where the students learn to budget, optimize limited resources, think critically to overcome challenges, and become teachers who work with children, parents and other teachers to create a good school where the children's knowledge and capacities are built for their future.

Animal husbandry and agricultural production features at the school to increase nutrition in the daily diet and prepare students to implement food production.

Women carry heavy responsibilities in their communities and families, but due to traditional norms, they are given few opportunities for education.

The Teacher Training College promotes gender equality, and has achieved near 50% female participation.

In November 2022, 17 Teachers started the Network of Graduates in Guinea-Bissau. The activities aim to support each other in improving the quality of teaching.

The Network of Graduates works to improve knowledge, skills, experiences, and practical actions and is committed to active community participation.

It builds on working together across the different schools, where the teachers work, and through this contribute to the improvement of the operation and quality of their schools and meet the challenges of children and parents.

The Teacher Training College has offered training in pedagogical subjects to 25 teachers from Vocational Schools in Guinea-Bissau.

This was an extraordinary initiative that allowed piloting a new approach in the context of pedagogical training for trainers in technical and vocational education and training.

The ADPP-GB Teacher Training College, Bachil is grateful for the contributions and cooperation from the ADPP-GB Counterpart Fund, the Humana People to People partners, the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research of Guinea-Bissau and the Ministry of National Education of Guinea-Bissau.

The ADPP-GB Vocational School, Bissorã

Human diversity is essential for development; hence, the ADPP-GB Vocational School, Bissorã operates as a boarding school to optimize training time, welcome young people from all over the country and provide more personal and socially comprehensive training to include all.

The courses have evolved over the years to suit the changing environment to cope with the fundamental change in demands which is taking place in Guinea-Bissau.

The practical training is highly valued, with most of the time dedicated to "know-how" applied at school and in the communities.

The practice periods enable the students to test their newly gained skills through planning and implementing community initiatives that improve the living conditions of people.

In addition, it engages the students in the community with various projects in agriculture, construction, provision of safe drinking water, and techniques to promote best agricultural practices.

The cooperation with Ianda Guiné! Hortas – Nha Horta i Nha Sabura continued in 2022 in the Horticulture, Fruit culture and Nutrition course. Under the cooperation, 23 students graduated after six months of training.



In September 2022, a new two-year agreement was signed with ENABEL to carry out refresher training activities and services provided at Vocational School.

The Vocational School continues to encourage women to enroll in the courses, as this is essential for strengthening their role and capacity to partake in the development of the country.

During 2022 just 28% of the 144 students were women, so effort and new initiatives are still needed in this respect.

ADPP-GB highly regards the contributions from European Union in Guinea-Bissau, African Development Bank, ADPP-GB Counter Part Fund, ENABEL, Humana People to People partners and the Ministry of National Education of Guinea-Bissau.

Culture project in Bissau.

Active participation is fundamental for change in the communities. That is why the projects are community-driven.

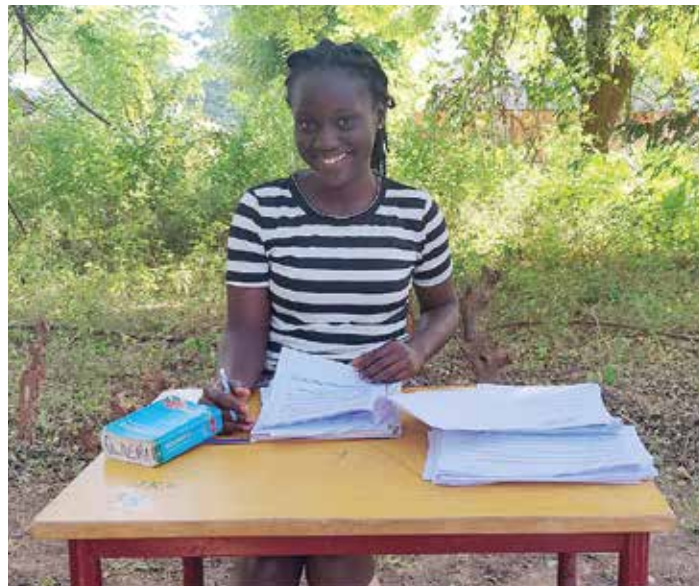
In January 2022, a new 2-year culture project started in Bissau. The new approach builds on the previous culture project implemented by ADPP-GB in the past.

Human diversity is essential for development; consequently, inclusion is fundamental in creating a world where all are active in creating the future.

That is why the 127 youths trained include people with disabilities to increase common understanding and build their capabilities to develop and perform cultural activities from which they can earn an income.

Culture is used to gather and inform people. For example, theatre, dance and music have been used to promote better health in the communities.

Later in the project, there will be entrepreneurship training, support of the cultural groups, and installation of recording equipment.



The Culture Centre in Quelelé carries out training in music, cooking and dancing.

Further, the Culture Centre in Plack II will install recording equipment and enable youth's groups to record, share, and market music.

The activities are supported by PROCULTURA, managed by Camões, I.P. with funding from the European Union.

Child Aid sanitation

Basic sanitation is important for all communities in maintaining health and increasing lifespan.

In the Child Aid Guinea-Bissau – Water, Energy and Sanitation project, ADPP-GB implemented the project in cooperation with ASPAAB.

As a result, out of 650 communities, 300 communities maintain ODF (Open Defecation Free, PACOMA) status.

Of the 350 new communities, 256 have been certified as Open Defecation Free by 2022.

Communities continue to create awareness and education in water and sanitation.

In 2022, the project worked closely with Water Resources General Administration to secure that the communities are ready to be declared ODF (Open Defecation Free).

The project was supported by Ianda Guiné! Lus ku iagu, managed by TESE with funding from the European Union in Guinea-Bissau.





Common meetings as a tool to move matters

A common meetings as a tool to move matters The common meeting is about all teachers and students coming together to discuss school and out-of-school matters and examine the positive and negative aspects of the school's progress.

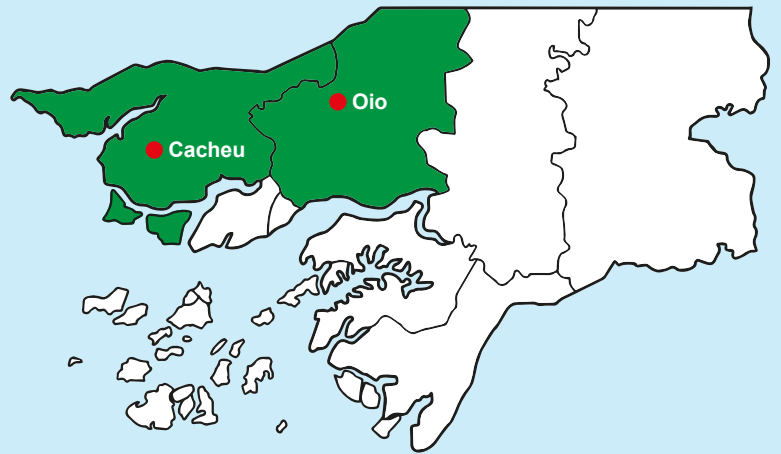

Agriculture and Environment





Small-scale farmers

They play a crucial role, in securing food for their families and communities, thus contributing to the country's economy and fighting global warming and climate changes by producing locally.

ADPP-GB operates Farmers' Clubs methodology with thousands of farmers constantly developing the Agriculture and Environment programme to connect food security by protecting the environment and recycling resources.

Most rural farmers are women, so their training and capacity-building promote equality, influence, economic earning, and independence and strengthen their opinions in the communities.

This is highly reflected in our Farmers' Clubs approach. Professionalising agriculture work and organisation open a better perspective for the community youths.

That is why ADPP-GB invites youths explicitly from the communities to join agricultural skills training programs with the perspective of getting their life career in this profession.

Every farmer trained is an active planted seed in fighting off global warming and climate change, achieving food security.

In 2022, some 2 050 farmers in 41 Farmers' Clubs produced 241 611 kg of vegetables for family consumption and sales.

The two processing centres were established and are ready to process the vegetables.

In 2022, the Agriculture and Environment programme reached 10 945 people in Guinea-Bissau.

ADPP-GB is grateful of the support from the European Union in Guinea-Bissau, ADPP-GB Counterpart Fund, African Development Bank, Humana People to People partners, the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development.



Farmers' Clubs: where farmers identify the challenges they face

Each Farmers' Club has 50 members, men and women, who jointly make decisions and take actions.

Clubs can be informally or formally registered and they also have opportunities to create co-operatives or join other farmers' organisations.

This means they can benefit from shared structures and financing opportunities.

Project leaders live and work among the farmers.

They are part of the community and work with the farmers and the clubs.

The organisation in clubs is a way for farmers to get together to share their knowledge and experiences.

They work together in demonstration fields, and have meetings, sessions.

Field days and agricultural shows are organized in the whole community.

Protecting the environment is a matter of high priority for Farmers' Clubs, as they depend on living in balance with the resources of the nature.

The Clubs strengthen the relationship between farmers' groups and public and private agricultural institutions in the local area through two-way sharing of knowledge and long-term collaboration.

The Farmers' Clubs are also linked to local government structures, which add expertise and help extend the project's impact beyond its time.

Farmers' Clubs extend into the social and cultural lives of the farmers and their families.

They improve the participation of women, and they care for health and nutrition, disease prevention and sanitation, as well as protection of land rights.

It's a methodology which is flexible and adaptable to local climatic, sociocultural and economic conditions.

Knowledge and cooperation changed everything

I am Elvira Batican Ferreira. Before the arrival of the landa Guiné! Hortas (Oio & Cacheu) project we faced immense difficulties, above all, lack of vegetables and a lack of income-generating activities to raise funds to meet our needs.

But with the intervention funded by the European Union and its implementer ADPP-GB, we have a dignified daily life, especially in vegetable production and a healthy diet.

Now we have a field of vegetable production with an area of approximately 0.5 hectare with complete fencing and two wells lined with plenty of water available for horticultural activity and human consumption.

landa Guiné! Hortas project provided scholarship for training in horticulture and nutrition. Under this scholarship, I was selected by my club to go and be trained for six months at the ADPP-GB Vocational School, Bissorã.

During the six months, I learned with the teachers and colleagues. Now I am a young trained in horticulture and nutrition with technical knowledge and experiences in horticulture.

After the training, I did an internship for one year in the project, operating from my community.

During my internship, I displayed my skills regarding the techniques learned during the training; I showed the vegetable producers new methods of quantitative and qualitative vegetable production.

Change to horticulture practices

My name is Fernando N'bundé. We used to practise monoculture in our community.

It is a fragile system and does not yield much. But, on the other hand, horticultural production is an activity that the community did not practice because they did not know the importance of the diet and how it can support the family's economy.

Now, farmers are organised into clubs of 50 members joining forces and learning new techniques from the project leader who is always with us in the community and has contributed to our community's development.

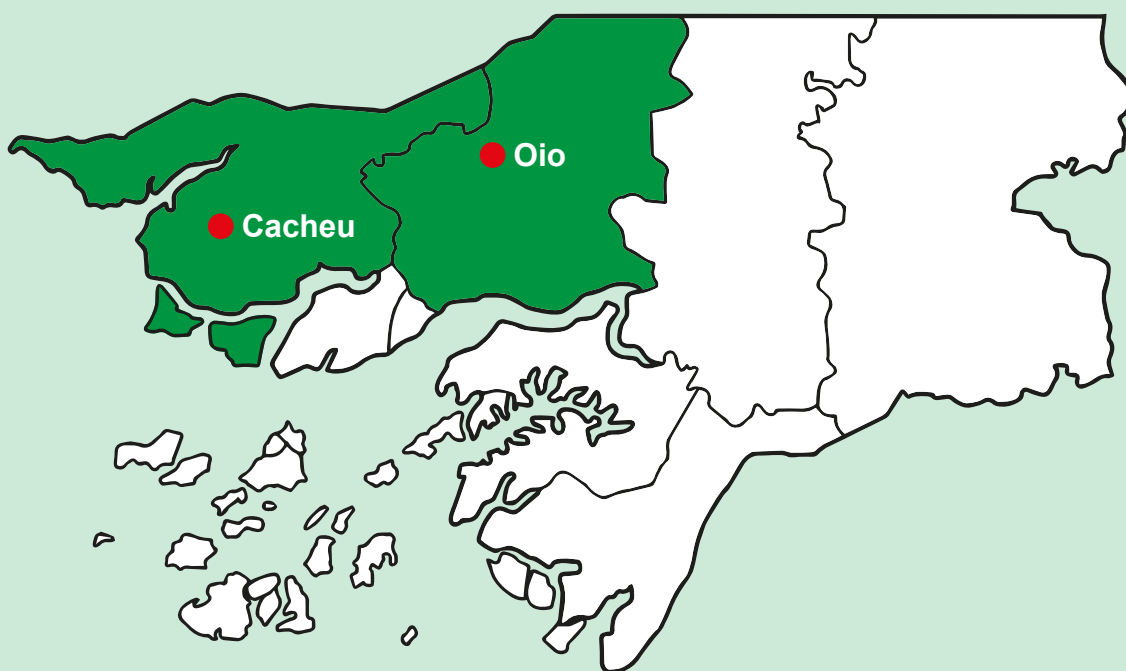

Health





Epidemics and environmentally created diseases constitute a major setback for education, economic development, and life quality.

Often women and children are the worst hit. People and communities are trained in epidemic self-defence, boosting health and good locally-based nutrition practices to be in control of their own lives.

That is why ADPP-GB practises comprehensive community and house-to-house mobilisation for people to understand and practise epidemic prevention.

Guinea-Bissau is a highly HIV-TB-burdened country. In 2020, there was a 12% increase in people diagnosed with HIV infection and TB according to the national strategic plan.

Basic trust is needed to minimise stigma and discrimination for caring for the sick and vulnerable in society.

That is why ADPP-GB Field Officers and the military's Peer Educators are pivotal in reaching out to the military population in the barracks.

As a result, the Field Officers and Peer Educators reached out to 10 086 people with standardised HIV prevention messages.

Viral Load testing / suppression and index testing targets are behind. ADPP-GB team and the armed forces are working together to mobilise index partners and increase the Viral Load testing.

Equipment and materials were bought as planned, which helped to maintain the functioning of the military laboratory in Bissau.

The year 2022 saw the ending of the first four years of the project with DHAPP by the end of September and a new grant was approved from 2022 to 2026.

In 2022 the actions increased the knowledge and understanding of HIV to 2 640 street vendors.

In the secondary schools, 3 600 sessions were held in 76 secondary schools.

The 200 Armed Forces were trained in Human Rights.



Fifty-one local associations in RENAP were trained in the rights and duties of PLHIV (designed to protect the infected person's health and reduce the spread of HIV to their sex partners and children).

The ADPP-GB, AGUIBEF, RENAP and AGMS furthermore, mobilised students, street-selling girls, and positive pregnant mothers to seek health centres to prevent their new-borns from getting infected.

New Terms of Reference (ToR) were introduced to regulate RENAP field staff, mentoring mothers and activists.

The ToR are guidelines for accompanying pregnant mothers in the health centre.

The activists followed the patients in treatment and could identify the LTFU (Lost to Follow Up) patients, thus contributing to adherence to the health services.

The nurses in the diagnosis and treatment centres (CDT) are engaged in finding the

contacts of TB patients and are willing to work with the project unit leaders (Supervisors) on finding TB patients in the community.

Sexual Reproductive Health (SHR) and Family Planning (FP) sessions were held to 4 818 youths in 32 schools.

In addition, to the promotion of SHR and reduction of stigma, 379 door-to-door sessions were conducted, reaching out to 5 069 people.

In addition, 42 teachers, 28 health personnel, 42 youth associations, and 150 community leaders were mobilised in the campaign to improve the health of youths by reducing HIV, sexually transmitted diseases, and unplanned pregnancies.

The Health programme is being implemented with contributions and cooperation from the DHAPP, Ministry of Public Health (HIV/TB program Global Fund), UNFPA, Coalition Plus, GAT, Camões, I.P., and Humana People to People partners.

No to stigma and discrimination

On a certain day, a field officer came to our premises. I was busy with friends discussing the voter registration exercise for the elections due in 2023. None of us were interested in the approaching Field Officer. Instead, we wanted to discuss politics and prepare for the elections.

The field officer targeted me, but I left the scene, leaving the field officer with my friends.

The next day, the field officer relentlessly approached me at the same place and respectfully asked for my attention. After listening to the field officer, I felt ashamed.

His touching story of people dying not because of the virus but because of stigma and discrimination left my heart bleeding with emotions.

Memories of my bedridden aunt in the hospital came to my mind. I felt compelled to do my part in HIV-related activities.

I felt inspired to participate in the activities. So, I started participating in the mobilisation sessions with all my friends. I started by partaking in HIV tests.

She asked about the type of tests we were doing. I explained to her that we were doing an HIV test.

Without wasting time, she asked to be tested. The team assigned me to attend the woman, and I took her to the nearby tent to discuss pre-test and post-test procedures.

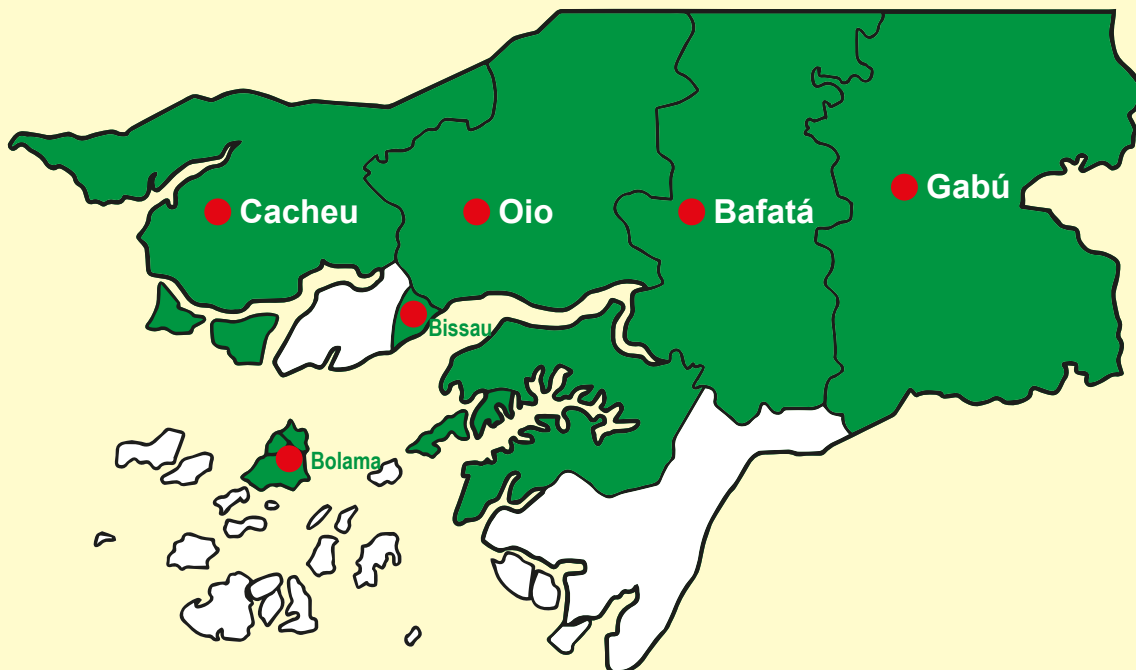
The woman decided to be tested, and her result was positive. We agreed to meet at the military hospital and open the patient's file to start treatment.

Indeed, she started the treatment, and I am always counting on her in my mobilisation efforts to inspire others unaware of the virus.

Economy and Entrepreneurship





People in Guinea-Bissau are highly entrepreneurial, and families and development in the country depend on that.

The different ADPP-GB's methodologies and services support groups and individuals in acquiring the understanding and skills to do a successful business.

Vocational School, Farmers' Clubs and the Teacher Training College support groups and individuals in acquiring the understanding and skills to do business.

Entrepreneurship

From 2021-2024, 100 young people in the Agricultural and Rural Entrepreneurship Value Chain are supported and 24 young people were trained in entrepreneurship. The training ended in July 2022.

Furthermore, in compliance with the same agreement Vocational School will train 300 young people in Entrepreneurship. Some 102 students were trained in 2021.

In the Blue Economy project, Cacheu, 960 fishermen improved their understanding of the environmental impact of plastic and improved fish processing.

They improved manufacturing practices to increase income by improving conservation.

In addition, 16 clubs trained in entrepreneurship created business plans.

WACOMP idea centre, with the support of UNIDO has supported the entrepreneurship office at the Vocational School, where youths will be supported to apply for jobs.



In support of the graduated teachers in rural areas, The Teacher Training College, Bachil, has included entrepreneurship training in the program, such as natural soap production, decorations, dance and theatre, cooking and pastry.

The training allowed the students to create small groups or associations in their communities of full-time pedagogical practice where they benefit from their production through sales.

The value acquired was used to support basic hygiene needs and part of their food. In addition, associations producing soap could sell more in their communities and neighbouring communities.

This success encourages entrepreneurship training for future teachers.

The Farmer's Clubs program has two purposes:

securing the family's food and a better economy, including entrepreneurship training and processing which empower women to be economically sustainable.

The Entrepreneurship programmes implemented with contributions and cooperation from UNIDO, African Development Bank (and the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development of Guinea-Bissau), UNDP and the Ministry of Fishery of Guinea-Bissau.



ADPP-GB Fundraising, 2nd Hand Clothes & Shoes sales in Guinea-Bissau.

People protect the environment through the re-use of textiles and shoes.

It creates jobs and improves the living conditions in Guinea-Bissau.

The sale contributes substantially to fundraising for the social development projects.

That is why 2nd Hand Clothes & Shoes sale is fundamental in our program bouquet, both for the economy and for environmental protection and sustainability on a global level.

The project is operated according to an agreement with the Government of Guinea-Bissau.

The agreement was renewed in 2021 and will serve for five years period, thus, allowing ADPP-GB to execute commercial activities with the purpose of fundraising for the implementation of development projects.

As part of this agreement, there is a counterpart fund for social and economic development supporting local organisations in Oio, the local administration of Oio, ADPP-GB projects in Oio and the Teacher Training in College, Bachil.

Since 2020, the 2nd Hand Clothes & Shoes Project has sorted the clothes into categories. This was convenient to the vendors as they got the quality and supply of what they needed in their business. In 2022, some 870 tons of clothes and shoes were imported, 219 tons sold in big bales and 651 tons were sorted into small bales.

Counterpart Fund

Some ADPP-GB projects were supported through the ADPP-GB counterpart fund established according to the general Cooperation Agreement with the Guinea-Bissau Government.

Part of the funds has been used to cover expenses for Vocational School, Bissorã & Farmers' Clubs in Oio and the Teacher Training College, Bachil.

Support to Community Organisations in Oio Region

The counterpart fund for social and economic development agreed with the Guinea-Bissau Government to support development projects in Oio region.

During 2022 the activities supported by this program include repairs of 4 schools damaged by storms and other natural disasters.

Creating a better life for my family

My name is Braima Dembo, and I have been a client of ADPP-GB in Bafatá since 2011. I started buying clothes with the money I borrowed from my colleagues. After I sold the clothes, I made a profit, and after some time, I gathered money and started buying without lending money from colleagues.

In 2013 I started to get my life organised. I married my wife, and we have two children and lived in my father's house. I told my father that I would rent my own house, and I started to rent a room, and then I managed to build my own home.

Further I bought my motorbike to make it easier for me to get to the market where I sell. Until 2015, I only sold one type of clothing: mixed clothing. ADPP-GB brought other types of clothes of different quality, but I preferred to buy only a mix.

In 2020 ADPP-GB sales agent spoke to me to buy a bale of skirts, dresses, and blouses, but I said I couldn't sell other types of clothes, only mix.

Now I buy different kind of Bales and sell everything. Thanks to the work that ADPP-GB has done for me. I made an achievement, and I am happy with my family because I can give them what they need.

My children are going to school as a result of buying and selling second hand clothes from ADPP-GB.

Cashew



Cashew nuts are part of the cash-crop and main export in Guinea-Bissau.

ADPP-GB cashew plantation was hired out in plots of 4,15 ha to 147 farmers who are earning a surplus while paying a fee to ADPP-GB.

In 2022 the farmers produced 162,2 tons of raw cashew nuts.

Most farmers delivered the cashew nuts to the cashew-processing centre owned and operated by ACACB (Associação de Clubes de Agricultores Comercial de Bissorã) Around 60% of the production is processed and sold to Naturkost Ernest Weber, and the other 40% is sold on the local market.

The factory is working on getting more local customers and securing the production in 2023.



Scholarship and capacity training

ADPP-GB employees are participating in various scholarships and distance learning programmes with the purpose of increasing their professional capacities and management skills.

Two teachers continue their distance learning in Pedagogy at One World University in Mozambique.

Nine employees are in one year training in Farmers' Clubs environment programs at Frontline Institute in Zimbabwe.

Three employees are training in creating education materials in cooperation with Humana People to People.

North South cooperation

In 2022 ADPP-GB received used furniture collected by UFF/HPP Denmark. The equipment was distributed to Caiomete Primary School, ADPP-GB Teacher Training College, Bachil, Vocational School, Bissorã, and Health program in Bissau.

The equipment has improved the quality and possibility of training. Further, school girls were enthusiastic when UFF/HPP Denmark came to train students and teachers at the Teacher Training College and Vocational School in creating woman's pads which can be washed and re-used.

In the same vein, a team from ADPP-GB Vocational School, Bissorã, ADPP-GB Teacher Training College, Bachil and two from ADPP-GB's construction team trained to repair chairs and furniture using simple methods.

Humana People to People Federation



ADPP-GB is a member of the federation for associations connected to the international Humana People to People movement.

It comprises 29 independent national member associations.

Our common agenda is to protect the planet, build communities and support people by connecting them with others in transformative programmes, unleashing their potential for positive change and action.

Accountability and Transparency

In 2021 ADPP-GB was officially certified for governance policies and procedures through the SGS NGO Benchmarking Standard.

This comprises an audit of best practices across policies and procedures and the organisation's compliance with these standards in 12 defined areas.

ADPP-GB continued to improve the policies and procedures in 2022.

ADPP-GB is registered as a local Guinea-Bissau organisation.

Our accounts have been audited by Audi Conta, a local owned auditing company.

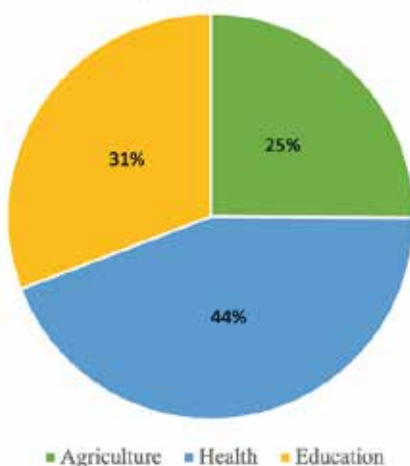
In 2022 ADPP-GB spent 2 291 360 € on development projects.



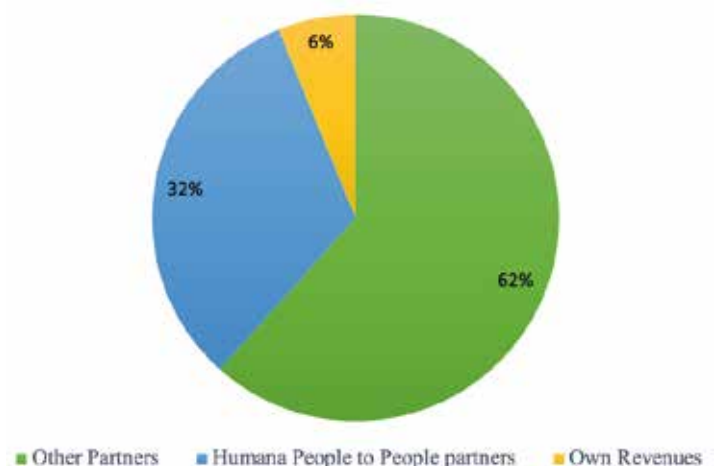
Income raised through partnership contributed with 62%, Humana People to People partners 32% and ADPP-GB generated through own income with 6%.
